In 1872 a contract was entered into by the Fairfield Canal Company for the Albemarle and Chesapeake Canal Company to excavate with their steam dredges the proposed canal in Hyde County from headwaters of the Alligator River (a tributary of Albemarle Sound) to Mattamusket Lake. Purpose to drain surrounding country and improve land; also for "a valuable feeder" with proposed steamboat service. Canal completed in 1874. $6\frac{1}{2}$ foot draft. Cited in A & C Canal annual report as only other navigable canal in North Carolina. "One moiety" owned by Albemarle and Chesapeake Canal Co. Cite need for steamboat connection as benefit to Hyde County. 1880 report cites A & C Canal owning $\frac{1}{2}$ of stock, and a small steamboat running from Elizabeth City try-weekly.
