The single greatest contribution to Waterford's industrial development was King's waterpower canal built about 1828 by John Fuller King. King performed a real engineering feat for those days by running two dams across the northmor fourth branch of the Mohawk River, the largest extending to Peebles Island. After holding back this water King released it through his canal running parallel to the river fully 1/2 mile. The water fell back into the Mohawk with a drop of sixteen feet. Along the 53 foot wide canal were built dozens of factories which turned out an almost unprecedented variety of goods. King and his group had vision worthy of today. They advertised their surplus power on New York's Wall Street as equalling "thirty run of mill stone." The canal became known locally as "King's Ditch". Each establishment had its own sluice gate.
