# October 25th Workday

The October workday followed several days of heavy rain. So there was water in the middle of the canal at our usual work site. So, we did our work just south of the southern towpath bridge where we could easily cross from side to side. At this point, the water on outside of the towpath and berm begins moving away from them, allowing more space for cut materials. This left an area between where we worked and our prior work for future workdays.

# Franklin – Bellingham SNETT Cleanup

The Franklin Bellingham Rail Trail Committee held a cleanup of part of the rail trail in Bellingham on Saturday, November 8th. A small group of volunteers met at Fox Run Road, and worked picking trash west to the Blackstone town line. This is west of the Rte. 126 bridge (which is planned for replacement with a tunnel) and Old Elm Street. We encountered mostly small trash such as beverage containers. In 2012, the Bay State Trail Riders had had an extensive work day in this area which removed heavier debris.

### **Blackstone Bikeway Update**

An inspection of the bikeway in Blackstone on November  $2^{nd}$  showed that work in Blackstone had been tied up for the winter with a smooth grade from Old Mendon Road through the Church St. cut to the Factory Pond Bridge. Further west, all of the right of way had been cleared from Factory Pond to Rte 146A and the Adams St. parking area in Uxbridge. Construction trailers had been moved into the Central St. parking area in Millville. Apparently, further work will await spring.

#### **SNETT** @ Prospect St., Franklin

The SNETT passes Prospect Street in Franklin in a deep cutting with a long masonry wall on the south side. Originally, the street crossed the railroad on a bridge, but this was removed after the tracks were removed. The latest plan is to replace the fill with a tunnel.

### **BRWA Fall Clean Up**

In early October, I learned that the Blackstone River Watershed Association would not be holding a fall cleanup on October 25<sup>th</sup> as I had first expected. .So, I scheduled a Conservancy workday then. Early, the week of the event, I learned that a few BRWA volunteers had decided to move forward anyway and were going to be working at the usual floating trash trap south of Plummers Landing. So, on that morning, two groups met at Plummers Landing. The Conservancy group went further south to our usual work site. On our return, we found the BRWA group having emerged from the canal with many bags of trash and some larger objects. These, the state picked up a few days later. After their work, the canal debris field looked much better.

## November 15th Workday

On our November 15<sup>th</sup> workday, we proceed to our usual word area and removed more brush from the prism. This time, we began where we had finished in September and worked south towards the October work area. There is still more to do between the two areas and we will attack that in December if the weather allows.

#### **Future Work Days**

The next work days are planned for Saturday, December 13th and January 10th. Meet 9 AM at the west parking lot at Plummer's Landing, Church St., Northbridge. The plan is to work on clearing debris in the dry bed of the canal. Volunteers are requested to bring loppers, bow saws, brush cutters, and work gloves. No power tools will be used. Dress appropriately for the weather and ground conditions. Expect to get muddy.

Please volunteer to help on any work day you can make time available. **You** can help make a noticeable difference! The more people present, the more that we can do to improve the canal and adjacent trails.

#### St. Paul St. Bridge, Blackstone

One canal structure that is little noticed is the twin arch, masonry, St. Paul St. Bridge in Blackstone. This structure was built in 1851 (just after the canal closed in 1848) by Daniel Simmons who later built the Saranac and Rolling Dams, also in Blackstone. The bridge is 57 feet long, and 32 feet wide including an 8 foot wide separately supported concrete extension on the upstream side. The bridge was built as part of the original St. Paul St. construction of the same era. St. Paul St. is a major local road carrying heavy traffic. The bridge is barely noticeable due to much vegetation around it. Just west of the bridge on St. Paul St., is the junction with Canal St. and then the recently rebuilt SNETT bridge followed by the
